The Oakwood Historical Society has launched its new Century Home Marker Program, celebrating Oakwood's treasured, older homes that make our community so unique.

The Century Home markers will be awarded to homes 100 years of age or older, and that contribute to the architectural and historical ambience of the Oakwood community. The Society will research date of home and original owners prior to awarding the plaque. The goal of this program is to instill a sense of pride and preservation of Oakwood's beautiful century homes.

Each marker is made of cast solid bronze and measures six inches in diameter. The cost is \$210 for Society members, and \$225 for non-members. A great gift idea for your family to enjoy for many years.


Our archival collection includes much more than just printed documents, letters, photos, books, and oral histories. We also boast a rare and wide-ranging collection of memorabilia, chronicling the storied past of Oakwood and a few of our illustrious residents.

Some of our most treasured items include original portraits of our early settlers, personal items from John H. Patterson, H. E. Talbott's humidor and Christmas cards sent from Orville Wright. The collection varies widely in scope— from an original Olmsted blueprint, early Schantz Park maps, film reels, Oakwood Pottery, school ephemera— and even a doorknob from the Runnymede Playhouse!

And our collection just keeps growing. This year, through a generous donation, we added a single-owner collection of 20-plus vintage dresses, dating from the late 1880s to the Roaring Twenties. These dresses belonged to an Oakwood resident and were donated by her niece.

We recently had on display at Wright Memorial Public Library a trophy from a Runnymede Playhouse tennis tournament. This was received from longtime Oakwood resident Delores Klaber. Mrs. Klaber was instrumental in the founding of The Oakwood Historical Society in 1974.

Ms. Klaber also recently donated a trophy that was awarded at the Dayton Golf Club tennis tournament in 1906. It is most fitting to feature this trophy in this newsletter to accompany

Over the Years... Highlights from the City Council Minutes Digitization Project 75 Years Ago in Oakwood (1947)

The dispute of the residents of the Oak Knoll Plat continued. Residents submitted a petition to rezone lots 1-8 in the Oak Knoll Plat (the 8 lots on Far Hills Ave just north of Dell Park Ave) to residential. The City's response can be summarized as: *It is a "cardinal principle of good zoning practice" that portions of a street lying directly opposite each other should be zoned alike.*

Several of the lots have been zoned and used for commercial purposes for many years, and there is a growing need for additional business area.

If there are private restrictions in deeds, the city cannot enforce them; they need to be handled in court.

50 years ago (1972)

Mr. Fredrick Davis of 5 Ivanhoe Avenue requested permission to speak to a matter which occurred on July 14th with the Oakwood Police Department, since it was his feeling that Council should be aware of a situation involving a parade on said date. The Roger Krupnic Marching Band of Butte, Montana, was staging a parade, consisting of approximately fifty people, in honor of Mr. Davis' birthday, and although no permit had been obtained by the marchers, it had paraded over three-fourths of a mile within the City before being stopped by the Police Department. Mr. Davis indicated that the Police Department overreacted in this situation in what amounts to harassment to the young people of the community.

As this matter had been the subject of a court hearing, and a trial was scheduled, Council indicated that it would be inappropriate to comment with a trial pending, with any testimony being presented to a Judge. Subsequently, one of the three defendants was found guilty of holding a parade without a permit.


Get Involved with The Historical Society
